### What is RWI?

In Key Stage I we use Read Write Inc (RWI) as a phonics programme.

This programme meets the demands of the National Curriculum and the reading strategy to give your child the best chance of success.



### How does it work?

• Children in Year I and Year 2 have a 45-minute RWI Phonics lesson everyday at IIam. They also have I hour of English a day.

• RWI lessons include, speed sounds, speedy green words, red words, story book words and reading. At Shepherdswell we include handwriting within this session.



### How does it work?

- 44 sounds
- Over 150+
   graphemes
- One of the most complex alphabetic codes in the world.








# Fred - Segmenting and blending unknown words









## Aim for end of Year I

• Children are accurate and speedy readers and are able to pass the Phonics Screening Test.

• One-to-one tutoring - no child is left behind.

Reading books align with the sounds learnt in class.



### Aim for end of Year 2

• Children are accurate and speedy readers and are confident at retrieval skills, comprehension, fluency and developing performance skills.

One-to-one tutoring - no child is left behind.

• Reading books align with the sounds learnt in class.



## Fluency

- Reading is not just decoding. Fluency and accuracy in reading are vital.
- Children who are decoding as they read will not understand what they are reading. Fluency occurs when children can read over 100 words per minute.
- Children must read like a storyteller.
- · Read Write Inc helps most children achieve this.



## Supporting your child with reading

- Only I in 3 children are read a bedtime story night
- Reading a bedtime story every night to your child improves their outcomes.
- · Children are only reading from books that are entirely decodable
- We only use pure sounds when decoding words (no 'uh' after the sound)
- We want them to practise reading their book at least 3 times across the week working on these skills: decode, fluency, expression.



## Supporting your child with reading

 We want children to create a strong orthographic map. This means that they learn sounds spelt by the letters or groups of letters in each word. To read fluently, or well, we need a strong orthographic map.

• To consistently recognise that the in 'ea' bread spells /e/ we need to read it at least 4 times. This means we need to read the word many times to build fluency for reading.



### Letter Formation

• We want children to learn how to form letters fluently using a tripod grip and having the correct starting and end points.

Rehearsal of this is the key

- Magic Pencil
- Mark making
- Cutting and sticking
- · Using variety of tools to mark make
- · Core strength and posture
